



Since the introduction the Swedish parental leave reform in 1974, fathers have had the same rights to use parental leave as mothers. Parents can split the 480 days 6_ they choose, but within the allowance, each parent has a minimum period of three months' leave, which may not be transferred. While there is no obligation to take the whole three months, parents lose anything they do not use. The government is currently considering an increase in the 'use it or lose it' element of leave for fathers, who ⁷____ often go back to work after six weeks or 8____. It has been proposed that

Travelling by underground when you're 1____ in a big city is invariably much quicker than driving.
