Sentence Stress

LEARN

Words in a sentence receive different stress, often based on the word's importance to the meaning of the sentence. Content words are important for the listener to understand what the sentence is about. They are usually verbs, nouns, adjectives, adverbs, question words, and negatives. They receive the stress and are pronounced strong, long, high, and clear.

Words that are not content words, called function words, do not usually receive stress in a sentence. These words include prepositions, pronouns, conjunctions, auxiliary verbs such as *be* and *have*, and articles.
